**Toronto, March 5, 2007** – Torontonians fondly believe that its neighbourhoods are the heart and soul of the city. But disturbing new findings from a University of Toronto SSHRC-funded study of 30 years of census data suggest that the gap between rich and poor is widening at an increasing rate. Even more troubling, the differences between the ‘haves’ and the have-nots’ appear to be playing out on ethnic lines. How will this affect the city’s sense of place? What kind of future do new immigrants face? If these trends persist, what kind of city will Toronto be decades from now? With similar fault lines emerging in the 905 as well, these issues need to be urgently addressed. Join us in the search for solutions.
